BARTON ARTS 2019

Every year in March the Barton Arts Committee completes the programme for the summer and we start to look forward to warmer days and a myriad of cultural activities happening around the town. The 22nd Arts Festival runs from 27th June to 7th July with a whole new programme and a new one day event, the Barton Art Trail. Every year the range and number of events seems to increase and this year we are delighted to be presenting performances across a number of the town's venues.

For theatre lovers Rhodri Miles performs Shylock, and The Pantaloons return with another free performance in Baysgarth Park, an irreverent romp through Jane Austen's *Sense and Sensibility*. Comedy is provided by Justin Moorhouse on the last date of his UK Northern Joker tour while Stuart Marconie, bestselling author of travel, culture and social history books as well as one of Britain's best known radio presenters across many BBC networks, presents Jarrow; Road to the Deep South.



Music is well represented this year with Folk through the Seasons, on the opening weekend with Will Pound at Ropery Hall and The Carnival Band at The Assembly Rooms. The Opera Dudes bring us songs from the shows at Trinity Church, The Lydian Choir performs at St Mary's Church and Folklics complete the week with the new folk map of North Lincolnshire.

New for 2019 is a full day Art Trail. On Saturday 29 June between 10am and 4pm there will be a number of free events happening in Barton with music at St. Peter's Church which will be open free to the public for the day thanks to English Heritage, organ music at St. Mary's, Morris Dancing and exhibitions at Wilderspin School Museum, storytelling in the park, street theatre and Barton Ukes and hand bell ringers performing in gardens. Have a wander round Barton and catch performances that take your fancy.

Add to the above the annual Graham Saunders Lecture, Fathom Writers' flash fiction publication launch, art exhibitions, Monday Night at the Movies, Trinity Church's Flower Festival, Songs and Scones at St Mary's and we have a festival!

The full programme of events and details of our sponsors will be available in April with tickets going on sale for Barton Arts members at the end of March and to the public on April 15. Tickets will be available from The Ropewalk and on line through the Barton Arts website.

Priority booking for all events will be given to members. Make sure you don't miss out by joining Barton Arts for just £10 a year. BARTON ANNUAL TOWN MEETING details on pages 15 to 18

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Work has continued apace on enhancing Barton's Baysgarth Park following a busy summer in 2018.

Last July saw the opening of the Chad Varah Memorial Garden by Felicity Varah-Harding, the daughter of the founder of the Samaritans, Chad Varah who was born in the town.

Later the same month, the Friends of Baysgarth Park, the group that has been spear-heading the improvements to the park in conjunction with North Lincolnshire Council heard that the park had been awarded the prestigious Green Flag, the top international award that recognizes parks and green spaces awarded annually.

Group chairman Cllr Paul Vickers said that looking back on 2018 it had been very rewarding to hear all the positive comments about the work undertaken in the park.

"The paths around the park have been very well received by pedestrians, those with prams and mobility scooters who can all now access the park without getting muddy," he said. "At the time of going to press we are continuing extending the path from the Memorial Garden to the one established last year as well as expecting suitable decorative fencing and gates to be erected at both ends of the Garden shortly along with a pergola."

"At the same time the Barton Park Bowls Club have been hard at work ensuring that the green is ready in time for the new season while North Lincolnshire Council is working on this year's application for Green Flag status," he continued.

"Many people have wondered why the park toilets are no longer open and the answer is sadly the block is a continued target for vandalism. North Lincolnshire Council has once again just renovated the toilets but in future they will only be open when organised events are taking place in the park."

A working party made up of volunteers will be meeting one afternoon a week once the weather has improved to tackle neglected areas of the park.

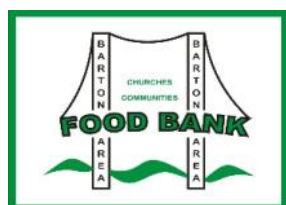
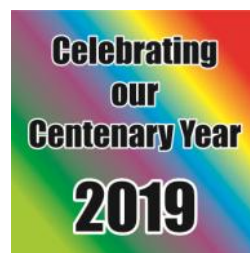

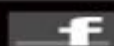
BARTON AREA FOOD BANK

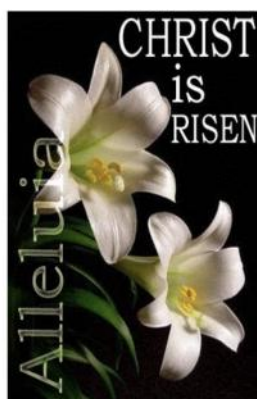

BELFRY NEWS

Bells, like any other musical instrument or mechanical device, require regular maintenance and attention. As some of you may remember, last autumn the clapper fell out of our number six bell whilst we were ringing for Sunday service. Luckily we were able to fit a replacement with the help of our marvelous steeple Keepers and TLB Services. The costs of this repair were covered by our own funds.

At the same time TLB Services offered to do a maintenance check on all the bells as no major work had been done for about ten years. The resulting report (which is available to view, see contact below) recommended that certain upkeep is required to the bells to keep them ringing safely over the town for the next ten years, at least. The cost of this work is going to be almost £5,000. With grants, which we may be eligible for, from the Lincoln Diocesan Guild of Bell ringers, there may be the possibility that we may be able to cover the cost, again, from our own funds, but it would leave our bank account severely depleted.

The bell ringers donate to our own funds with loose change every time they ring, and some add their wedding fees, visiting ringers also donate, but it takes time for these amounts to build up. The funds are used for regular maintenance by the Steeple Keeper for new stays, ropes, bolts etc. Obviously in the present financial climate, and with the church needing help with upkeep itself, we appreciate that not everyone is able to respond to our appeal. Environment Committee Report 2018/2019

Another year has passed in which North Lincolnshire Council tidied up the Market Place and Whitecross Street with new flower planters. We have also had new waste bins and flower tubs round the rest of the town. The seats along the Humber Bank have been well used this summer. This year's bulb planting has been shared with Friends of Baysgarth Park Group for the new Chad Varah Memorial Garden, I would also like to congratulate them on Baysgarth Park being awarded Green Flag status. The remaining spring bulbs were planted in Barton Humber Bridge Viewing Area. We have received funding from North Lincolnshire Council Winter Community Grant Planting Scheme to improve the grass area between The Old Coast Guard House and Public Toilets at the Viewing Area to create a picnic area this year. Two new flowering planters will be installed outside the Co-op in Market Lane also with funding from this Grant Scheme.

The Best Kept Garden and Hanging Basket Competition will be held again this year, we had a few more businesses enter last year, it would be great to have more residents entering their gardens and hanging baskets too. The entry form for 2019 will be in the July Bartonian, copies will also be available from the Town Council Office from June 2019.

We plan to continue with our own hanging baskets and planters around the town centre, these can be seen from the Beck area, along Burgate, High Street, King Street and George Street. The flowerbeds on Ferriby Road and Barrow Road will be planted with spring and summer plants.

Thank you to all the volunteers, including members of Barton Civic Society, Barton Lions Club and Barton Rotary Club for their help. I would also like to thank Councillor John Sanderson for co-ordinating the Great British Spring Clean in Barton, we joined the National Campaign in 2017 and 2018, we will do the same in 2019.

Finance & General Purposes Committee Report 2018/2019

This will be my final report as Chairman of the Finance and General Purposes committee of the present Barton Town Council.

As you may be aware the Town Council will be reduced from 22 members down to 12 with the wards of Park Ward and Bridge Ward combined into one Ward called Barton upon Humber. The new council will take the helm after the local elections, which are to be held on May 2nd this year.

With regards to my report, I am pleased to inform you that once again Barton Town Council has kept the council tax at the same level for the fifth year running. This is mainly due to continued new house building in Barton bringing in extra income and the committees delivering their projects within the budgets set last year. Our external auditors have signed off the Town Council accounts with no major problems brought to our attention. This means we are leaving the new Council with a healthy balance sheet, adequate reserves to enable the new Council to continue to deliver services for the benefit of the residents of Barton.

My thanks go to the Town Clerk and Deputy Town Clerk for their hard work over the years and no doubt they will continue to serve the new Council in the same professional manner.

Finally to my fellow councillors, I wish them well if seeking re-election and to those who are not seeking election thank you for all your hard work and dedication to our Town.

Planning Committee Report 2018/2019

Chairman: Councillor John Sanderson

Barton Town Council is a statutory consultee with regard to planning applications within Barton town boundary and as such North Lincolnshire Council is required to invite BTC planning committee to consider every application that is submitted. This year we have considered approximately 94 planning applications, slightly less than 2017/2018.

Applications are varied and consist of: - new housing developments, existing residential modifications and extensions, work to buildings within Barton's conservation area, work to be carried out to trees under the protection of TPO's (tree preservation orders) changes of use of existing properties, commercial advertising signs, new retail applications and new public buildings applications.

The Planning Committee looks at each planning application that is submitted, following discussions on each application (and in some cases a vote) we state whether the committee wish to object to the application with comments or not, regardless of whether we object or not we may also submit comments on the applications. Where the committee do not object to an application in principal, we may have concerns and these concerns are noted as comments on our reply.

The Committee ensure that, in Barton, planning applications and amendments comply with the resultant location and use criteria, within the current Local Plan and with the additional rules that apply in the Conservation Area. Flooding risks continue to be a concern and the Committee draws this to the Local Authority's attention where we feel it should be investigated further.

There are strict guidelines on what may or may not be taken into consideration when the Committee considers an application, these are "material planning considerations" and "non material planning considerations" and we must adhere to the planning guidelines. As a statutory consultee North Lincolnshire Council invite Barton's Planning Committee to consider planning applications, however North Lincolnshire Council is the decision-making body.

The Committee meet every 3 weeks in the Committee Room of the Assembly Rooms at 7pm. Dates of meetings together with a meeting agenda, showing plans to be discussed, can be found on the Council's website <http://bartontowncouncil.org.uk/> and are also displayed in the notice board outside the Town Council Office at the Assembly Rooms in Queen Street. The plans can also be found on the North Lincolnshire Council website at <https://apps.northlincs.gov.uk/> or a hard copy of agenda applications can be inspected in the Town Council Office opening hours 10am-midday Monday, Wednesday-Friday. Residents are welcome to come along to our meetings and if they wish they can request to speak at the meeting on specific agenda items. They can also make representation to the Committee in writing.

It should be understood that this Committee's remit is to carefully review all Barton's Planning Applications and to make the Town Council's views known to North Lincolnshire Council. Our interest is on behalf of the town as a whole, and we cannot become involved in personal matters or disputes arising from such applications.

What Councillors Can Do

Being an effective councillor requires both commitment and hard work. Councillors have to balance the needs and interests of residents and the council. These will all make legitimate demands on a councillor's time, on top of the demands and needs of their personal and professional lives. Before you consider becoming a councillor you may want to discuss it with your family and friends to make sure they understand what you are taking on. You will need their support as you'll have to spend some of your spare time on council business.

Councillors are elected for a four year term or next election, or may be co-opted by a casual vacancy to the local council to represent their local community. They must either live or work in the area, aged 18+, qualified to be elected and support/represent the views of the local electorate. Becoming a councillor is both a rewarding and privileged form of public service. You will be in a position to make a difference to the quality of other people's daily lives and prospects. Councillors must sign a 'Declaration of Office', sign a 'Register of Interests' and must agree to observe the 'Code of Conduct 2011', a statutory instrument led by and abide by the ethical framework. Failure to do so, may lead to disqualification. Failure to attend any meeting of the council for a six month period will also result in disqualification.

A Town Councillor for Barton-Upon-Humber Town Council is a voluntary post. Councillors are summonsed, having a legal duty to attend meetings. It is a responsibility/best practice to give apologies/reason for non-attendance, and voting at meetings not abstaining. They can be on committees/sub-committees providing interest/expertise on a particular subject. They are part of a corporate body and must abide by majority/democratic decision. Councillors can act for the council if authorised to do so on a committee, but they cannot act for themselves. They should influence council policies to improve the local quality of life. Councillors may represent the council on outside bodies i.e. neighbourhood action team, school forum etc.

The councillor's role and responsibilities include:

- decision-making
- developing and reviewing council policy
- regulatory, quasi-judicial and statutory duties
- community leadership and engagement.

Both North Lincolnshire Council and Barton-upon-Humber Town Council provide services for the local community. The following information details how the precept and grant levied by the town council is spent on local community services and facilities.

Barton-upon-Humber Town Council is committed to maintaining and improving the quality of service it provides, and endeavours to ensure these services are delivered in a cost-effective manner.

Service Provision:

The town council precept and grant is used to provide the following main service classifications for 2019/2020:

(a) Community Committee

Publication of 'The Bartonian', provision of the Christmas Festival, town centre Christmas decorative lighting, the Christmas tree, Children's Christmas lantern making workshops, Picnic in the Park event and donations to local organisations. Financial support to Barton Arts, Barton Bike Night, Barton Carnival, Barton Lions Bonfire & Firework Display, Barton Tourism, Barton Senior Alliance, Barton public convenience opening and maintenance of the town clock.

(b) Environment Committee

Organisation of the 'Best Kept Gardens/Hanging Baskets Competitions' and the presentation evening. Town entry into regional competitions, provision of hanging baskets, planters, public seats, notice boards, litter/dog waste bins, bulb and tree planting. Financial support for provision of the local town bus service.

(c) Public Halls and Recreation

The Assembly Rooms located in Queen Street, Barton, are leased to CHAMP Ltd, a charitable organisation.

(d) Other

Provision of town council central administration and establishment, the town council office, Mayoralty functions, the Annual Town Award and Remembrance Sunday Parade. As a consultee, the town council considers and comments upon local planning applications to the local Planning Authority North Lincolnshire Council and provides local residents with an opportunity to view current planning applications.

Election 2 May 2019

Parish and town councils are led by democratically elected councillors from the local community.

These local councillors decide on what services and projects the council will deliver. As representatives of the first tier of local government, and the closest to their communities, local councillors are best placed to engage with their residents and find out what the real local issues are and how to overcome them.

Local councils run elections to encourage residents who are passionate about their community to stand for election and thus contribute towards what goes on in their community. There are currently 120,000 councillors serving on the 10,000 local councils in England. The position of Town Councillor is a voluntary unpaid post.

Do you, or someone you know, have what it takes to be a local councillor? Following North Lincolnshire Council's Community Governance Review in 2017 Barton will no longer have 2 Wards, Bridge and Park Ward which had 11 councillors on each, total of 22 Town Councillors. From May 2019 Barton will be covered by one Ward – Barton Town Ward, with a total of 12 Town Councillors. Barton along with many other Town and Parish Councils will have a contested Election on 2 May if more than 12 candidates return their nomination papers. North Lincolnshire Council Local Elections will also be held. 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Chips are down and wonky veg is up!

It's official – the great British Chip is down in size because the extremely hot, dry weather last summer had an impact on the potato harvest, as reported in the papers in early February. I certainly found this with some of my crops – fewer and smaller potatoes. In previous years a single plant would do a couple of meals. Last year, we needed two plants to get enough for one meal. Some of the schools taking part in our growing competition found this too. The key to success is a soil with plenty of organic matter to retain moisture and watering if it doesn't rain. So congratulations to Winteringham Primary School who got this combination just right, to produce a massive 15.8kg from just 10 seed potatoes and won the first prize of a £30 voucher from Gooseman's Growers in Barrow upon Humber.

Down on the plots we have been busy over recent month with all the usual winter jobs and some new initiatives. Thanks to a grant from North Lincolnshire Council, we have finally managed to replace the old communal hut which has been there since 1934, a year after the society was founded. The minute books record that Mr J Drakes undertook to fill 5 gallon oil drums with concrete for the hut to rest on. These pillars are still there and are being used to support the new building. We have been busy marking our equipment with bright orange paint and smart water unique to Barton's Allotments, as part of the North Lincolnshire Council Safer Allotments Project. Plans for our events for 2019 are also well underway.

The first event will be having a stall at The Ropewalk's Gardening Day on 19 May, followed by opening the plots to the

public on 29 June, to coincide with our mid-summer garden party. Opening to the public was first done on 8 July 1934 with donations being collected for local hospitals – pre NHS days. If anyone has any old photos of life on the plots or anything else about the history of the Society they would like to share, please let us know.

Plans for the 69th Horticultural Show are also well advanced. The show will be on 10th August at Trinity Methodist as usual. We have been revising the classes for exhibits adding veg like squash, sweet corn, peppers and chilli. We have simplified some others and are introducing two new classes for the first time – giant vegetables and wonky vegetables. Until recently supermarkets would only sell the so called "perfect" veg, resulting in a huge amount of waste. Thankfully, many are now catching on to the fact that the wonky ones taste just as good, and so sell them too, so all that water we were short of last year, doesn't go to waste either.

As I have said many times before, you don't need a huge space to start growing your own – herbs, salads, chillies and peppers can be grown in window boxes or yard containers. However, if you do fancy a bit more space with a half or full plot please get in touch via our web site www.barton-upon-humber-allotment-society.com or give me a ring or send an email. There is a small waiting list, but the sooner you are on it the sooner you will get a plot.

Finally, a bit of history being made – Congratulations to our first woman Chair, Penny Thornton, who was elected at the recent AGM.

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Wilderspin National School Museum

England's first Infant School opened in 1819, In Westminster. It was there that Samuel Wilderspin began his lifetime's work promoting infant schools throughout the British Isles, culminating in Barton in 1845 when his Infant School on Queen Street opened.



This Model School, demonstrating his system of teaching and characteristic layout, and his "signature" playground, was restored by the Queen Street School Preservation Trust ten years ago and is one of the most important historic schools in England. Wilderspin is Barton's link with an innovation that began two hundred years ago, and spread across the country and overseas.



From 1816, James Buchanan (left) taught in Britain's first Infant School at New Lanark in Scotland. In 1819 he was invited to run England's first Infant School, in Westminster where he met Samuel Wilderspin (right) and must have triggered Wilderspin's interest in infant education.

The weather in Barton during 2018 – somewhat drier

In 2017 some 645 mm = c. 25½ ins of rain fell on the weather station at 8 Queen Street. In 2018 the year's total proved to be somewhat less at c 565 mm = 22¼ ins. This is not far off the average annual rainfall in Barton over the last 20 years. On average about 1,300 mm – 51 ins of rain falls on the UK each year so, as usual, Barton's rainfall is about half of the national average.

The 2018 monthly totals in mm, with 2017 totals in brackets - were: Jan – 50 mm (32 mm), Feb – 31.5 (71.5 mm), Mar – 56.5 (35.25 mm), April 76.75 (21.25 mm), May – 33.75 (68 mm), June – 13.25 (68 mm), July – 24 (78 mm), Aug – 43.75 (71.5mm), Sept – 49.5 (47 mm), Oct – 47.5 (27.75 mm), Nov – 67.75 (50 mm), Dec – 71.5 (48 mm). It is interesting to note that whilst June was Barton's wettest month in both 2016 and 2017 it was the town's driest month in 2018 – such are the ups and downs of UK weather. Last year I warned Bartonians not to holiday in June - this year it is again to be recommended. Like 2013, 2015 and 2017 there was not a single month in 2018 when 100mm + of rain fell on the town.

I did have a problem in 2018. In late November – early December I enjoyed two balmy weeks in southern Spain. On arriving back in Barton on 8 December I found my rain gauge full to overflowing with 60 mm of water. I have no idea how much I lost and wonder if there is another rain collector in the town who could let me know the exact daily figures for the period 22 November to 7 December. I gave 30 mm of the 60 mm equally to November and December so the totals for those months could be a bit inaccurate – will try better in 2019.

As in 2017 Barton Beck's artesian springs failed to flow in the later part of the year and the water level fell dramatically. Notwithstanding, the number of ducks in residence seemed to increase month on month in 2018 – so there must be a decent food supply in the water. And then my imagination wanders. In the centuries before c.1000 AD it seems likely the Beck was used as a baptismal pool before the building of the western annexe at St Peter's church which excavation has shown housed a font. I wouldn't fancy baptising my child by either submersion or aspersion as the pond appears today – 22 January 2019. Did the springs flow non-stop I those days (probably likely) or did one wait for the appearance of a Beck full of pure water before contemplating the sacrament?
